1. FITNESS CHECK

Ex-post evaluation ("fitness check"):

focus on the five oldest EU waste stream directives:

- sewage sludge
- PCB/PCT
- packaging waste
- end-of-life-vehicles
- batteries



Fitness check: working method and planning

- Jan. 2013 Apr. 2014: external study
 - building on previous studies and implementation reports
 - literature and empirical research
 - focussed stakeholder consultation (≠ public consultation)
- April/May 2014: Commission Staff Working Paper
 = basis for further policy decisions on way forward



Fitness check: key questions

Standard evaluation questions regarding:

- Effectiveness
- Efficiency
- Coherence
- Relevance



Fitness check: effectiveness

- what progress made towards achieving objectives of Directives and targets in various Member States? In line with initial expectations?
- which main factors contributed/hindered achieving objectives?
 e.g. implementation by Member States, action by stakeholders, cooperation between producers and recyclers
- any other significant results achieved?

e.g. safer EU access to raw materials, reduced GHG emissions and/or spurred innovation



Fitness check: efficiency

- Costs and benefits associated with implementation in various Member States?
 Significant cost differences? Cause?
 Any costs out of proportion with benefits achieved?
- Good practices of cost-effective implementation.

e.g. use of economic instruments, cost-effective EPR schemes, product policies

- Specific provisions making make cost-effective implementation more difficult?
- Directives kept fit for purpose through regular adaptation to technical and scientific progress?



Fitness check: coherence

Commission

- Do directives satisfactorily complement other parts of EU waste law (esp. Waste Framework Directive) and coherently reflect concepts such as life-cycle thinking, resource efficiency and five-step waste hierarchy?
- Inconsistencies and unjustified overlaps (e.g. definitions/key concepts) across and between directives concerned and other parts of EU waste law (esp. Waste Framework Directive)?
- Scope for aligning key aspects across directives concerned?
 e.g. provisions related to exports
- Obsolete provisions?



Fitness check: relevance

- Issues addressed by the directives still match current needs?
 Still action at EU level required?
- Factors (e.g. eco-design) influencing end-of-life impacts sufficiently integrated into the directives?
- Consistent with Commission policies on resource efficiency and raw materials?
- Covering all relevant waste streams or gaps in present EU waste legislation?
- Further EU waste legislation required to achieve objectives set out in the Resource Efficiency Roadmap?



2. TARGETS REVIEW

Review of quantitative targets in three Directives:

- Waste Framework Directive,
- Landfill Directive,
- Packaging and Packaging Waste Directive



Targets review: working method and planning

online stakeholder consultation in 2013 (3/06/2013 – 10/09/2013)

Impact Assessment and proposal first half of 2014



Targets review: questions on packaging waste

- Should the targets be increased?
- Are the relative levels for different materials 'about right', or, should e.g. plastics increase by more?
- Should environmental weightings be applied to the materials?
 e.g. in line with greenhouse gas savings
- Should targets be more specific (e.g. for PET, LDPE)?
- Should the target in the Packaging Directive
 - apply to <u>all</u> packaging waste? OR
 - apply <u>only</u> to commercial/industrial packaging waste, with packaging waste from municipal sources included in the Waste Framework Directive target?



3. PLASTIC WASTE





PLASTIC WASTE – need for action

- most common material since the beginning of the 20th century
- massive pollution of world oceans with plastic debris
- global challenge requiring a global response. EU showcase for how to build coherent strategy
- 50% of plastic waste in the EU is still landfilled
- energy and processed raw material lost instead of being recycled into new products
- no comprehensive policy response to challenges.
 specific aspects addressed in various pieces of legislation, e.g.
- Waste Framework Directive
- (2015 separate plastic waste collection target and 50% household waste collection target by 2020)
- Packaging and Packaging waste Directive





Green Paper on a European Strategy on Plastic Waste in the environment (7.03.2013)

- aims at assessing how problem of plastic waste can best be tackled in the context of the current policy framework
- wide-ranging public consultation (07.03.2013 07.06.2013)
 - 26 open questions (no specific format prescribed for answering)
 - contributions will be published on Internet
 - 30.09.2013: conference in Brussels
 - result will feed into further policy action in 2014 as part of the broader waste policy review



4. Plastic carrier bags

2010 data:



average use per EU citizen: 198 plastic bags (89% of which single-use)

municipal or private waste collection systems in the EU send
49,7% or 710 000 tons a year of plastic bags collected to landfills



Plastic carrier bags: timeline

- Environment Council of 14.03.2011 and 19.12.2011: Commission invited to assess the scope for action at EU level.
- 17.05.2011 9.08.2011: public consultation
- 15 538 responses
- contributions and statistics on Internet
- Assessment of environmental, economic and social impact of available options
- Commission proposal adopted on 4.11.2013
- Co-decision procedure: directive to be adopted by European Parliament and Council (end 2014 ?)



Plastic carrier bags: Commission proposal

- Main objective: tackle marine litter
- Focus on:
 - prevention = nr.1 waste hierarchy
 - Resource efficiency
- All types of plastic



- all plastic carrier bags below thickness of 50 microns
- Member States have to take measures that may include:
 - National reduction targets
 - Economic instruments
 - Marketing restrictions in derogation of Article 18 of the PPWD
