Context

What is the issue?




 The Drinking Water Directive (currently under revision) led to the proliferation of national provisions to ensure the hygienic safety of materials and products in contact with drinking water

 Member States have often adopted divergent provisions, while some Member States still do not have any scheme to assess the safety of such materials and products

What is the current situation?





What are the consequences?



- Different levels of consumer protection across EU Member States.
- A fragmentation of the EU internal market
- Endangering the competitiveness of the European industry by imposing significant financial and administrative burden
- Hindering innovation: companies lack of incentives to put innovative products on the market

Summary



- "Several Member States have set up their own approval systems for products in contact with drinking water, for which mutual recognition provisions mostly do not work and (these approval system) have been identified as an obstacle to the internal market"
- "The Article 10 provisions do not work well and represent a long term challenge to the provision of clean and healthy drinking water in the EU"

These conclusions are taken from the Commission REFIT EVALUATION of the Drinking Water Directive 98/83/EC (December 2016)

What is the Commission proposal to address this issue?



- The Commission proposal on the DWD states that:
- Hygienic requirements for materials and products in contact with drinking water are set under the Construction Products Regulation



Development of European standards for construction products in contact with drinking water

Assessment of the Commission proposal



The Commission proposal is **insufficient** in providing harmonisation:

- ✓ It will create significant **loopholes:** several products in contact with drinking water are not covered by the CPR (e.g. pumps, water heaters, hoses, water meters, and so on) and will not be harmonised
- > Standards under the CPR usually only define test methods and do not set the hygienic requirements against which products should be tested.

What is the solution?

EDW position

EDW Position



EDW supports a full harmonisation of hygienic requirements and test methods on drinking water applications:

- List of **substances** allowed in the production of materials (organic materials, elastomers, cement, metals, etc.) in contact with drinking water
- Other requirements mainly related to products
- Test methods
- A system to identify products in contact with drinking water compliant with EU legislation

EDW solution



To ensure <u>full harmonisation</u> and <u>high safety standards</u> all over Europe, the revised Drinking Water Directive should:

- 1. Give the **mandate** to EU institutions to adopt **legally binding acts** to harmonise hygienic requirements on materials and products in contact with drinking water
- 2. Include a review clause requiring the Commission to evaluate progress in harmonisation
- 3. Ensure a link between the Drinking Water Directive and the CPR: harmonised standards under the CPR refer to the legally binding acts adopted under the Drinking Water Directive (see point 1)
- 4. Encourage Member States to apply CPR standards to products not covered by the CPR only for drinking water purposes

EDW solution



EU health and environmental policy

Revised Drinking Water Directive (DWD)

- 1) Legally binding acts harmonising hygienic requirements:
- List of substances allowed in materials in contact with drinking water
- Other generic hygienic requirements
- 2) Encouragement for Member States to apply standards for construction products to non-construction products only for drinking water purposes

INTERFACE CPR/DWD

European standards would refer to delegated acts → construction products in line with delegated acts can be marketed throughout the EU

Potential harmonisation of <u>all</u> products in contact with drinking water

EU internal market policy

Construction products regulation (CPR)

European standards for construction products include:

- Test methods
- Requirements easily manageable under standards
- System to identify products in contact with drinking water compliant with EU legislation

The Commission will assess this system and take appropriate measures if needed (Review Clause under the revised DWD)

Benefits of the EDW solution



EDW proposed solution would:

- Ensure that all EU citizens enjoy the same degree of human health protection
- Deepen the EU internal market
- Stimulate the competitiveness of the EU industry and job creation
- Promote the development of innovative technologies and resourceefficient products
